SERMON

Baptism Sunday and Our Baptism

Today as I mentioned at the beginning is the first week of Epiphany.

This translates as "appearance" or "showing forth".

Epiphany means a usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something.

In the church it's the season of the manifestation of the humanity of Jesus, the birth and Baptism.

This past Monday was Día de los Reyes, or Three Kings day.

In some countries including my ancestral one in Mexico, three kings celebrate the day when the Magi came from the east and followed a start leading them to the Christ child.

For kids it means opening three gifts and having a day of celebration with a rosca, a bread that is made just for that occasion.

We are now delving deeper into the topic of Baptism.

Initially, we discussed John's stern invitation to the Baptism, where he referred to some as vipers and urged them to demonstrate true repentance through their actions, not just their words.

Today, we reflect on Jesus' Baptism as described in the book of Luke. This marks the beginning of Jesus' ministry and highlights the role of John the Baptist, as many people questioned whether he was the awaited Messiah.

I am curious friends, how many of you have been Baptized and when was it? I want to invite you to reflect on this as after this I would like to invite you to a liturgy as we remember our Baptism together.

Now back to my sharing I mentioned I was Baptised many times.

Last year I believe I shared that I was one of the most Baptized avatars here. Bear with me as I tell my story again for those who had not heard about my many Baptisms.

See, I was baptized as a baby at Cristo Rey Catholic Church in Brownsville, Texas. While I don't remember the ceremony, I've heard stories of me in a lovely white outfit, with my parents, Irene and Tomas Martinez, filled with joy. The event was significant enough to be featured in the Brownsville Herald, our local newspaper, and my family celebrated with a vibrant fiesta, fully embracing our Catholic customs.

I believe there were Mariachis and a lavish feast to mark the special day.

At twelve years old, I was baptized again.

My mother had left the Catholic Church to join a conservative evangelical Pentecostal group.

This change allowed me to actively embrace my faith and connect with my church community.

I learned that my infant baptism was considered invalid because I hadn't made that decision on my own.

In my late twenties, I underwent baptism for a second time, this time at what I believe was a Baptist church in Dallas, Texas.

This church held conservative values, and they believed I was genuinely becoming part of a community of believers rather than being associated with a less prominent

congregation on the border of Mexico.

Upon joining the UCC, I inquired whether I needed to be baptized again.

The answer was no. I

The United Church of Christ, baptism signifies entry into the universal church, connecting us with countless Christians globally.

I learned that the UCC honors baptisms performed during childhood or in other Christian denominations.

What a relief—I was on the verge of my fourth baptism!

Has anyone been Baptized more than once like I was? I'm just curious.

My Catholic parents believed I would burn in hell or be in limbo if as a baby the Priest did not sprinkle me with Holy water.

My evangelical church believed I would burn in hell if I did not accept Jesus as my savior, confess publicly my sins, and was born again with the submersion of my body in the water.

I mean all the way in!

In my twenties I was told that I had to really decide if I could be a productive member of a church and that my salvation had to be followed by my Baptism, the symbol of renewal and obedience.

The obedience to be cleanse, and to be forgiven as I gave a public declaration that I was going to be a productive member of the church by agreeing to commit to certain church activities.

As I reflect on the various interpretations surrounding my Baptisms, I find myself questioning why the sinless Son of God chose to undergo Baptism.

Could it be that this act was Jesus' means of demonstrating his humanity and humility? Perhaps it served as a symbolic anointing as he embarked on his new ministry, akin to how kings were anointed with oil, but in his case, he entered the water instead.

What do you think?

Jesus was born from and into a world of systematic sin. Baptism was the signal of the renewal.

The passage about the "threshing floor" and gathering wheat into the granary while burning the chaff with unquenchable fire intrigued me.

Is Jesus implying that some people are destined for hell?

Is He indicating a separation, deeming certain individuals unworthy and discarding them?

Could it be that those who reject Jesus find themselves cast aside?

According to a reading from Rev. Carol Lakey Hess, on Feasting on the Word it said, "By Jesus accepting John's baptism he refuted John's dualism between the wheat and

the chaff (v17). Because through his ministry Jesus showed no distinction with who we sat with and broke, they were all sinners and deeply flawed people."

And as his ministry is about to start he makes the distinction that he will like all those around him enter the water in obedience of renewal.

I can almost see Jesus in my mind standing with the crowd awaiting to be Baptized.

Hearing John scolding the Pharisees and the Sadducees, emphasizing that their lineage from Moses does not exempt them from the need to repent for their wrongdoings, which may include deceit and unkindness.

This situation reminds me of how churches often reflect the cliquish dynamics seen in high school, with groups forming around shared interests like music or sports. Joining the Universal Church or being baptized should not be viewed as an exclusive membership but rather as a shared commitment to love our neighbors as ourselves. It calls for a departure from old habits of revenge and self-interest, urging us to embrace a more compassionate and inclusive way of living.

When the phrase "you are my son in whom I am well pleased" resonates, the Trinity unites in a profound moment. The Creator's voice is heard, the Son stands in the water, and the Holy Spirit descends.

John paved the way for the Son of God to begin His ministry, embodying humility and a steadfast commitment to speaking truth to authority.

Each of us who have been Baptized might have a different story of how it happened. Some might have been sprinkled, some might have been dunked, while others might have been pour water over their heads.

Or like me, all of the above!

But regardless of how it occurred three things were present.

One - Water

Two - The community around you in most cases your family, and the church you were in.

Three - The words of institution from a Priest, a Pastor, a Minister "I baptized you in the name of the creator, in the name of Jesus Christ our Redeemer and in the name of the Holy Spirit."

For those who are new would you believe that such Baptism can happen here on Second life?

Well it has.

On January 7, 2018, Johnni (one of our members) was Baptized here on this sanctuary by our Founder and Pastor Jerry.

Many are taken back by this and would say, how on earth?

In Norway our beloved Jonni placed his hands in the water, surrounded by the support of our church community in Second Life.

Together, we embraced him as our brother, a member of our congregation and cherished community.

And our beloved Pastor Jerry (may he rest in peace) shared the words of the institution upon him.

First UCC in Second Life is a real church with a real community providing a space for all to be welcomed, affirmed, loved, and given the sacraments of our beloved church from Baptism to Holy Communion.

Each of us are real people behind an avatar.

Pastor Jamie, Chris and I are real pastors ordained in the United Church of Christ in a conference that is recognized as a real church.

Beyond that we are real because who we represent here on Second Life is our digital appearance embodying our actual person.

Jonni, you and I can hear the words from above saying "You, are my son, my daughter, you are my child. You are beloved. I am very well pleased with you..."

Embrace this truth, church. No matter your sexual orientation—be it Transgender, gay, lesbian, bisexual, pan sexual, asexual, or beyond—you are cherished. Despite what the world may say, you are loved and validated.

My sister the Rev. Rhina Ramos and I had the honor of baptizing our sister Adora in a swimming pool during a conference in San Francisco.

Adora chose baptism to affirm her new identity and name and wanted to be Baptized for the first time into the family of Christ.

While my brother Illan, who frequently visits us here on SL, had been baptized by his family in his church. He cherishes that moment but sought affirmation of his new name and identity. So, at the last General Synod, we celebrated an affirmation of baptism for Illan.

Please know we are willing to do all of this here friends.

Church, I believe in Christ not for the promise of heaven or rewards after death, but because I aspire to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, who reached out to those often marginalized and overlooked.

Jesus identity to be with the least of these not seeking the glory beyond that to God.

So I believe that we are called into ministry in our own ways using our gifts to empower and support each other through Baptism.

Baptism is a tangible form of entering, becoming and being.

Not with water alone but with community, with words of institution, with life. After his Baptism Jesus begins the walk of his ministry.

Jesus' Baptism does not separate him from others but rather sets him in the middle

of all the people willing to belong. That was talking the talk and walking the walk.

Reflect on your Baptism today, not merely as an event or a membership, but as a cherished badge of honor that signifies your inclusion in the beloved family of God. The journey as a child of God can be challenging, yet embracing self-love and extending that love to others, just as God loves us, makes the effort worthwhile each day.

And so my fellow friends I'm going to invite you to stand up with us. Come join me, really.

Let's form a circle or semicircle if possible around this Baptism thing.

And I invite you to read with us in your home this liturgy as Doug helps me read the congregations part.

And let us remember our Baptism together with our beloved siblings.

AFFIRMATION OF BAPTISM

One: Dear friends, on this day of re-creation we recall Christ's baptism, and we claim and remember our own.

People: We gather at this font of living water to celebrate the gift of God's redeeming grace.

One: For just as the body is one and has many members and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.

People: For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free, male or female—and were all made to drink of one Spirit.

One: Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. Amen
